The Johnson Historical Society has had a busy year. We continue to receive acquisitions such as items from the town's pharmacy which date back to the 1880's when C. P. Jones owned the business. We have created a doctor's office with items donated by Dr. Paul Rogers. We have started looking at 22 boxes of slides that belonged to Red Hooper. It is a treasure hunt as we find historic Johnson pictures, which we will digitize.

Can you help? We are looking for a picture that shows the original weathervane on the former Congregational Church, now the Lowe Lecture Hall.

Tuesday Night Live was a success. We are so grateful for our volunteers who donated 161 pies, 10 cakes, rolls and potato salad as well as McKenzie's donation of hot dogs. We earned \$5,268. Thanks to all!

Come see our new collections

We have two new collections added to our portfolio.

The first one from Dr. Rogers, recently retired after 37 years serving the Johnson and surrounding community. This collection includes a beautiful cabinet with several instruments and even an electrocardiogram machine from the 1970s.

The other collection, donated by Richard Simays, comes from the old Johnson Pharmacy that was located where today is the Tangles Salon.

The original pharmacy started operations on May 12, 1883, owned by C.P. Jones. In 1929 it was taken over by P.B. MacDowell, and in 1947 Richard's parents purchased it. This collection includes a prescription book showing all the local residents' prescriptions in writing, dated from 1883 to 1887. The pharmacy was a meeting place in town, also because its soda machine, a local attraction back in the day.

In addition to the prescription book you will find pill molds, a mortar and pestle, a sterno torch mini and many other items.
